BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Gerrard's Motto – "Success is a journey not a destination"

Gerrard Gosens is recognised as one of the most outstanding young people in Australia today.

Congenitally blind, Gerrard became Queensland's youngest Guide Dog recipient at age sixteen. Using a lap top computer with speech output to assist his studies, Gerrard achieved an exceptional TE score and gained entrance to the Bachelor of Business course at Queensland University of Technology. Gerrard's commendable academic achievements are matched by his skill and success at sport.

Gerrard represented Australia at the 1996 Atlanta Paralympics in the team sport Goalball, which is specifically for the vision impaired. After the Games, Gerrard decided to return to his former sporting love – running and represented Australia at the Sydney 2000 Paralympic Games in the 5000 metres, 10,000 metres and marathon, placing sixth in both the 5km and 10km, and seventh in the marathon. At the 2006 Athletics World Championships in the Netherlands, Gerrard placed fourth in the 1500m.

He's certainly no stranger to the long distances. In 1989, after months of planning and hard work Gerrard, with the support of soldiers from the First Signal Regiment, ran the 2000km journey from Port Douglas to the Gold Coast to raise money for charity.

After the success of "Mirage 2000", Gerrard and the soldiers from the First Signal Regiment went on to complete four further 2000km runs from Cairns to Brisbane. The hard work and dedication of Gerrard and the soldiers has seen much needed funds raised for the community through the success of the 2000km ultra marathon.

Gerrard's many achievements; strength and determination to succeed at whatever he does, saw him named Young Queenslander of the Year in 1995, and a finalist in the Young Australian of the Year.

Meanwhile, Gerrard is busily continuing writing his book called "My Eyes had a Wet Nose", which illustrates many of the unique and entertaining experiences that Gerrard encountered with his guide dogs, Joey, Anchor and now Summit. The book will provide the community with a valuable insight into the experiences of a person with a disability, and the achievements that can be obtained, regardless. Gerrard certainly believes that "success is a journey, not a destination".
