#### **PLEASE NOTE**

For a group to be eligible to receive funding legally you must show that:

The activities are not for profit, not for personal gain or by one person or family;



- The Group is **"incorporated"**. If the group is not an incorporated body, you will need to find an incorporated body to **"auspice"** the proposed project and receive the approved monies for your group. The Auspice organization may also do the accounting for your group's grant. Some groups also hire the bookkeeper of their sponsor, and cost that into their budget request in the funding submission. This will strengthen a funding submission, as partnerships are more visible with this arrangement, and the organizing community can focus on the project activities, without, for example, the pressures of GST bookkeeping;
- Funding generally is for projects/activities that are **not yet started**. You need to adjust your plans for activities for the delay between **submission due date**, receiving the **official letter** and **receiving the grant**. This can take up to three months or more.

#### The **strongest submissions** generally are those that:

- involve partnerships with more than one cultural group;
- invite the broader community in at some stage.
